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FOREWORD

Who are we?

Objectif France-Inde (OFI) is a non-political and nondenominational non-profit French association under the law of 1901, founded in 1998.

OFI assists its partners, Indian NGOs, in the design, coordination, monitoring and evaluation of their projects, while facilitating their access to international funding.

OFI's strength comes from a large presence on the ground and knowledge of political and economic issues.

OFI directly involves the populations supported in an inclusive development approach, thus guaranteeing the quality of the projects implemented.





OFI's Vision

OFI works in favour of particularly vulnerable populations, children, women and farmers in rural or remote geographical areas.

OFI draws on its expertise of nearly 30 years in the fields of childhood and education, health and hygiene, integrated rural development and women's empowerment.

OFI's actions make it possible to **avoid or slow down the forced exodus of low-skilled rural populations to Indian megacities** where they find themselves in even more precarious economic situations.


OFI is convinced that **supporting and training local NGOs** to improve the living conditions of the population is the key to the country's development. This is especially true when these NGOs can work in collaboration with certain government programs.

2024, a year of growth for OFI

More than 550,000 people benefit daily from the actions implemented by OFI since its inception.

In 2024, more than 12,000 children were directly involved in the projects developed by OFI, more than 93,000 new women were enrolled in self-help groups and more than 3,000 farmers were able to benefit from OFI's actions in access to water and training in reasoned and sustainable agriculture. The projects set up by OFI and its partners have also made it possible to improve the living conditions of the families of the beneficiaries, which multiplies the number of people concerned.

Like last year, 2024 was marked by the **growth** of OFI with a strong **increase in the funds raised**. This has allowed the association to support **more projects** while continuing those previously launched and to partner **with two new NGOs** in Tamil Nadu.



To be able to ensure effective project monitoring, OFI has decided to strengthen its team in India with the recruitment of **two new project coordinators**. To strengthen the sustainability of the actions put in place, OFI has focused on training the staff of partner NGOs, particularly in remote areas.

Finally, OFI's office in France has committed to **a financial transparency approach** with accounts audited by an auditor. Every penny of your donations is used in the most efficient and sustainable way possible.




OFI AND THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS



OFI'S AREAS OF INTERVENTION

Currently, OFI and its partners operate in **South India** in **Karnataka** and **Tamil Nadu** and in **North India** in **West Bengal.**





OFI'S PARTNER NGOS

In KARNATAKA



The projects carried out in Karnataka focus mainly on the **populations that migrate to Bangalore** for economic reasons and mainly concern **children and education**. OFI works in partnership with two NGOs in Bangalore: **Dream India Network (DIN)** and **Vonisha Service Foundation**.



DIN (Dream India Network) is an organization founded in 2011 committed to promoting sustainable change in the quality of life of citizens in India. Its objective is to promote and encourage collective action in response to the growing needs of children, youth, women, and other marginalized and abandoned people.




Vonisha Service Foundation is an organization established in 2017, operating in the slums of Begur, Bangalore district. Vonisha's role is to support the most disadvantaged people and to fight against inequalities based on caste, religion, skin color or origin. The organization has a particular focus on migrant communities who have arrived in Bangalore for economic reasons.

In TAMIL NADU

In Tamil Nadu, OFI operates mainly in the districts of Trichy, Karur and Dindigul. OFI implements **multidimensional integrated rural development programs around agriculture and rainwater conservation, children and education, as well as women's emancipation**. OFI's partners in these districts for integrated rural development projects are **SEVAI**, **GRAMIUM** and **ISSAI**.

In Trichy, OFI works in partnership with **DIN** (Dream India Network) and **HUT India** in the field of **mental and physical health**. In the district of Villupuram near Pondicherry, OFI has established a new partnership in the field of **women's empowerment** with **Kalvi Kendra**.



HUT (Human Uplift Trust) has been engaged since 1987 in the education and health sectors, serving vulnerable and precarious populations in rural Tamil Nadu. HUT runs an English-language school for children from Dalit communities in Mannachanallur. HUT has also established an orphanage and school for children infected and affected by HIV, "House of Hope".



DIN (Dream India Network) is an organization founded in 2011 committed to promoting sustainable change in the quality of life of citizens in India. Its objective is to promote and encourage collective action in response to the growing needs of children, youth, women, and other marginalized and abandoned people.



Founded in 1978 in the Villupuram district of Tamil Nadu to help communities affected by communal violence, Kalvi Kendra has since expanded its social development activities and humanitarian services throughout Tamil Nadu, in collaboration with government and private agencies. A local resource centre for education and development, the organization focuses on poverty reduction, micro-enterprises, women's empowerment, environmental protection, and children's education. It implements and tests a series of community development programmes aimed at improving the situation of marginalised and disadvantaged populations

IN WEST BENGAL

In West Bengal, projects support **the education of** street and migrant **children**, **access to appropriate care for children and adults with disabilities**, as well as reception centres for young people with disabilities in about fifteen remote villages. OFI works in partnership with **ABC** (Asha Bhavan Centre), **PARAS PADMA** and **ICOD**.





ABC (Asha Bhavan Centre) is an organisation that has been working on behalf of marginalised communities in West Bengal since 1999. ABC's mission is to create meaningful opportunities for the social and economic development of people, so that they gain dignity, fairness and self-confidence. ABC provides quality education and support in very poor rural areas through its school programme called "Bodhoday Vidya Mandir" (BVM). In addition, the organization provides medical rehabilitation services in its two homes for disabled and abandoned children.



PARAS PADMA, established in 1998, is a social welfare organization that supports children with disabilities and destitute patients in West Bengal. The objectives of Paras Padma are multiple: to educate and empower people with physical disabilities, to raise awareness and promote the defense of the rights of people with disabilities within the community, to assess the need for braces.



ICOD is an organization that has been working for marginalized communities in West Bengal since 2004. ICOD's mission is to create meaningful opportunities for the social and economic development of people of all ages, the destitute, the abandoned, so that they can gain dignity, equity and selfconfidence. ICOD offers an interreligious center in harmony with nature.

OFI'S AREAS OF EXPERTISE

1. Childhood and education

Education is a key issue in India. Access to school infrastructure and regular education remains difficult, mainly in remote rural areas, but also in urban areas. In cities, rural families who migrate for economic reasons often find themselves in unsuitable and indecent housing. This has a negative impact on the physical and mental health of their children.

OFI's objective is to enable these children to go to school and live in a stable environment that allows them to hope for a better future.

2. Health and hygiene

Physical and mental health is a prerequisite for social and economic development.

OFI's objective is to promote access to specialized care centres for children and adults from marginalized communities as well as reception in adapted structures for children and adults with disabilities who are often left behind by society.

3. Integrated rural development

In India, rural populations are the first to be directly affected by climate change and reduced water availability.

OFI's objective is to ensure food security and strengthen the resilience of these populations to reduce the rural exodus. OFI promotes optimal use of natural resources as well as sustainable agricultural practices through appropriate training.

4. Women's empowerment

In Indian society, the place of women is still very often restricted to the family environment and domestic tasks as well as to the education of children. Too many Indian women, especially in rural areas, are financially dependent on their husbands.

OFI's objective is to empower women to carry out incomegenerating activities and thus enable them to be agents of change in their communities.









OFI'S PROJECTS IN 2024

1. Childhood and education

OFI intervenes in the field of children and education by supporting schools, foster homes and financing educational infrastructures.



Support for schools

In 2024:

- → OFI has participated in the financing of the operational expenses of 11 schools, i.e. more than 3500 students,
- → OFI has financed 40 evening school structures for about 850 children,
- → OFI supported bridging programs to reintegrate out-of-school children for about 350 children,
- \rightarrow OFI has developed two projects to promote the practice of sport in schools,
- → OFI organized 6 training sessions for teachers.

Digital literacy

The "**Bits'N'Bytes**" program helps rural youth, especially young women from disadvantaged backgrounds, learn computer skills through well-equipped computer labs. This allows them to improve their chances of finding a job. The program also helps young people obtain a government degree in collaboration with recognized institutions, providing them with better career opportunities.

Extracurricular

"Beyond the Bell" is an after-school program for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. The centres, located in slums and rural areas, offer daily supervision, homework help and extracurricular activities. It also provides free educational materials. Learning is thus facilitated and allows children to build a better future for themselves.

Promotion of sport and physical health

The "**Sports for School**" program promotes the importance of sport in schools to improve students' physical health and academic performance. Badminton, football, cricket and athletics are included in the school curriculum as well as extracurricular activities in the form of sports clubs. This encourages teamwork, discipline and personal growth. The program also provides students with the opportunity to participate in competitions, making sport an important part of their overall development.

Operational Support to Schools

The "**Shiksha**" **project** helps disadvantaged children in rural areas of West Bengal to access primary education. Through its Bodhoday Vidya Mandir (BVM) schools, Asha Bhavan Centre (ABC) operates 11 schools that serve approximately 1,500 students. The project aims to reduce the education gap and support children's right to learning. It also provides financial support to cover the running costs of these schools, ensuring an uninterrupted education for these children.



OFI also continues to encourage interculturality in these schools by integrating young French Civic Service Volunteers, who team up with the educational staff.

Foster homes

The "**Small Home, Big Dreams**" project helps foster homes care for vulnerable children between the ages of 6 and 18, providing them **with a safe and positive place to live**. These are children living on the streets or in slums in Bangalore, from very poor families and without access to education. Each home accommodates up to eight children.

The program provides them with a quality education in an English-language school, healthy meals, medical care, and emotional support. OFI has been working with **Dream India Network** (DIN) on this project since 2016. So far, DIN has opened 113 homes, which house 904 children.

Currently, OFI supports **20 households in Bangalore and Mysore** by helping to fund daily expenses, education, and sometimes renovations.





Infrastructures

The **"Building Blocks"** program contributes to the improvement of schools in rural areas by building important facilities such as classrooms, computer labs, and training centres. The aim is to create quality learning spaces and thus contribute to the growth and development of rural communities. In 2024, OFI contributed to:

- → the construction of five classrooms at the Meikandar School, managed by our partner HUT,
- → the construction of a **743** m^2 training and production centre for ISSAI,
- → the establishment of a new classroom and a training centre for SEVAI,
- → several **elementary school renovations** for ABC,
- → a boarding school dedicated to higher education in Bangalore for Dream India Network (DIN).



2. Health and hygiene

Several projects are implemented to:

- $\rightarrow~$ ensure access to appropriate and specialised care,
- \rightarrow welcoming children affected or infected with HIV,
- \rightarrow enable the reintegration of adults with precarious mental health into the community,
- \rightarrow promote hygiene with the construction of toilets.



Access to adapted and specialized care

The "**Ortho**" project of Paras Padma and Asha Bhavan Centre aims to provide **physiotherapy**, **hydrotherapy**, **speech therapy and orthopaedic support services** to children from poor and remote communities. Patients receive medical assistance as well as orthopaedic prostheses if necessary. Advice is also given to parents to ensure complete care. The aim is to improve mobility, encourage independence and create an inclusive society for children with special needs. In 2024, OFI supported:

- → 4 speech therapy and physiotherapy centres treating 200 young children,
- → 1 specialised care centre for disabled children with a prosthesis workshop.

In 2024, OFI's Civic Service Volunteers collaborated with the care teams of the ABC centres to strengthen the care provided to children, particularly through physiotherapy and occupational therapy.



Support to children affected or infected with HIV



OFI's programs to support children with HIV aim to improve the lives of children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS through two key initiatives. The "**HIV Nutrition**" project, implemented with our partner GRAMIUM, provides essential support, including nutrition, education, medical care and psychological support. The House of Hope Association (HUT) runs a **shelter for HIV-infected children**, which provides them with safe housing, nutritious food, counselling and access to education through a branch school. These initiatives ensure a holistic approach to care, giving children the support they need for a brighter future. In 2024, OFI supported:

- → 202 children affected by HIV through the nutrition and education programs,
- → **1 home** for children affected by HIV, i.e. 100 children.

Reintegration

In partnership with ICOD in West Bengal, DIN in Tamil Nadu, and the local authorities, two residential care centres have been established to provide care, rehabilitation, and treatment to more than 100 people with mental disorders and living in precarious conditions. Residents benefit from medical examinations, counselling, therapies to help them recover and reintegrate into society, as well as research to find their families (in the DIN centre). The program also conducts awareness campaigns to educate the public about mental health, reduce stigma, and promote social acceptance. In 2024, OFI supported:

 \rightarrow **1 home for 40 adults** with mental disabilities.





Hygiene, access to toilets and drinking water

Hygiene, and especially access to water in daily life, remains a major concern in many rural areas of India. OFI has developed health awareness programs that focus on crucial topics such as hygiene, sanitation, and general well-being. They aim to give communities the essential knowledge to prevent disease and improve daily living conditions.

The rehabilitation of reservoirs has enabled the construction of artesian wells in villages to facilitate the supply of water for toilets and household chores as well as access to drinking water.

In 2024, OFI contributed to the refurbishment of **80 toilets** with its partner GRAMIUM as well as **hygiene training**, provided by social workers, to ensure the correct and sustainable use of these infrastructures.

3. Integrated Rural Development

Agriculture, with all the associated sectors (seeds, fertilizers, tractors, etc.), is the main source of income for a large part of the Indian population. 70% of households in rural areas depend on agriculture for their daily needs and 82% of farmers have small farms. Most agricultural land is dependent on the **monsoon system for irrigation**. With **climate change**, it is becoming more and more erratic, which leads to a **consequent drop in the level of the water table**. This phenomenon is increasingly visible in Tamil Nadu, where the inhabitants, driven by the lack of water, leave their land to seek work in urban areas.



OFI's rural development program helps vulnerable populations by focusing on sustainable agriculture, water conservation, and women's empowerment. It addresses major challenges such as water scarcity, declining agricultural productivity, and economic migration caused by limited employment opportunities.

Key activities include **renovating the village reservoir to improve water availability, training farmers** in sustainable farming techniques, **planting trees** to increase vegetation cover, and **setting up organic composting units**. In addition, **women** from marginalized communities are provided with **vocational training** and **access to microcredit** through self-help groups (SHGs), enabling them to gain financial independence.

This holistic approach contributes to long-term stability and food security in rural areas, thereby reducing poverty and preventing forced migration.

In 2024, OFI worked with its partners on the following projects:

- \rightarrow "Let's Cultivate Development" with SEVAI,
- → "Water Source of Life" with GRAMIUM and ISSAI,
- \rightarrow **"Eau'tonomie"** with GRAMIUM.

Tank rehabilitation

These programs aim to **reduce the rural exodus** by increasing the incomes of local populations and ensuring their basic needs.

A **rehabilitated reservoir** irrigates **250 acres** of land, or 100 hectares. The availability of water promotes crop yields and thanks to the watersheds, farmers can harvest up to **3 times a year**.

In addition to increasing arable land and yielding it, **the availability of water** makes it possible to supply village wells, relieving women of daily chores, the first step towards their emancipation. The water is used for **sanitary needs** (toilets, laundry, etc.). Access **to drinking water** is also a way to allow families to stay in the villages living in decent conditions.

This year again, the projects have benefited many farmers and their families.

In 2024 with its partners:

- → OFI has rehabilitated 6 watersheds in Tamil Nadu with the NGOs ISSAI, GRAMIUM and SEVAI and has thus reached the figure of 100 watersheds rehabilitated,
- → OFI drilled 10 wells for access to drinking water in the villages,
- → OFI has rehabilitated **100 open-pit wells**,
- → OFI has planted **14,000 trees**,
- \rightarrow 600 hectares have been put back into cultivation.

The localities targeted for these projects are the districts of Dindigul and Karur, not far from the city of Trichy.



Sustainable agriculture

For several years, OFI partners have launched several activities promoting sustainable organic farming to address climate change through a selection of environmentally friendly agricultural activities. This includes the **use of organic waste, animal husbandry** and **beekeeping**.

Local NGOs offer various training courses to local farmers who benefit from the projects.

In 2024:

- → 20 trainings were provided for 400 farmers, focusing on the use of organic fertilizers and pesticides, made from natural products such as fish, lemon or cow urine,
- → 8 vermicompost units have been built. Vermicompost is an effective and inexpensive natural fertilizer for farmers.



In the projects implemented by OFI, a rational use of water is also required, with drip irrigation systems to reduce water consumption. Farmers are invited to think about how to promote their resilience to climate change and drought.

Reforestation and biodiversity regeneration

Integrated rural development projects also aim at reforestation and the regeneration of biodiversity through the planting of tree species from the region. Increasing vegetation cover also prevents rainwater from draining too quickly without penetrating the soil.

Geo-satellite data before and after renovation obtained with our technology partner The GreenGood Labs made it possible to scientifically quantify the impact, on the regeneration of plant cover and the increase in the number of crops per year.

In 2024:

 \rightarrow 14,000 trees have been planted.



4. Women's empowerment

In rural villages in India, women face major challenges such as poverty, illiteracy, unemployment and violence. These barriers are exacerbated by their domestic responsibilities and limited mobility, which limit their ability to engage in income-generating activities. This economic gap is holding back not only the growth of their communities, but also that of society. Craft traditions, a precious heritage of these communities, are also threatened by the challenges of modernization and economic survival.



Creation of self-help groups (SHG and JLG)

OFI is committed to supporting women's social, economic and personal development by creating or reactivating self-help groups (SHG or Self-Help Groups, and JLG or Joint Liability Groups). The aim of these groups is to facilitate the emancipation of women by enabling them to obtain microcredits and develop income-generating activities. This not only leads to an improvement in their own economic situation but also has a wider positive impact within their family and society.

In 2024, OFI continued to support the SHGs of previous years while creating new groups through the "**STEP for WOMEN**", "**WomenRISE**" and "**SAKHI**" projects set up with our partners SEVAI and Kalvi Kendra in Tamil Nadu and Vonisha in Bangalore.

General **training** is provided to groups:

- \rightarrow entrepreneurship,
- → personal development,
- \rightarrow health and hygiene,
- → financial management.

For some groups, more specialized training is set up:

- \rightarrow vocational training,
- → computer training.

Participants are **made aware of saving** through the opening of a joint bank account, to which they must all contribute monthly. Women can lend money to each other through this account, and the repayments are recorded in a follow-up booklet.

After the various training courses, some of which lead to a **diploma recognized by the government**, the participants have access to a **bank microcredit**. By learning about financial management, participants acquire **the autonomy** essential to their social and economic emancipation.



In 2024:

- → **5,997 new women** supported,
- → 500 women trained in income-generating activities,
- \rightarrow 180 women trained from migrant communities,
- \rightarrow 672 self-help groups created.

Since the start of the women's group projects, **12,000 groups** have been formed involving **170,000 women**.

Entrepreneurship: economic activities

Self-help programmes provided by OFI and its NGO partners enable women in disadvantaged rural areas to acquire skills and engage in income-generating activities. They have the possibility to create individual or collective activities according to their wishes, in the field of their choice:

- → manufacture of banana products, jute bags, pottery, napkins, coconut products, snacks and edible articles,
- → cultivation of jasmine, flower petals, rice, bananas, Korai grass,
- \rightarrow mat weaving, handloom weaving,
- \rightarrow aesthetic.

Public banks as well as the government play a key role in these programs. They provide microloans at low interest rates and sometimes subsidized by the government. Loans and repayments are strictly monitored by the various social workers financed by OFI. The latter send the financial reports to the banks on specific evaluation criteria.

Local **authorities** (Panchayats) are also **involved** in the monitoring and training of women. They support the groups and organise certain training courses to ensure the sustainability of the activities. These aspects ensure the **stability of structures** and contribute to the emancipation of women.



Preserving craft traditions

In 2024, together with the local partners SEVAI, GRAMIUM and ACT, the "**Kalakari**" **project** was launched to address the challenges of women's empowerment and the preservation of craft traditions. **150 women were involved** in the project for the start-up.



This ambitious project aims to:

- → **Train and support women in rural areas** by providing training in various traditional trades that enable them to acquire skills and engage in economic activities.
- → Preserve local know-how with a focus on preserving artisanal techniques such as carpet weaving, embroidery, textile and upcycling of saris. These skills are not only sources of income, but also essential elements of the cultural identity of communities.



- → Promote ethical artisanal practices by supporting access to fair markets to ensure that artisanal products are valued at their true value, while respecting ethical and sustainable standards.
- → Create entrepreneurship opportunities by encouraging women to become entrepreneurs, providing them with the tools and support to start and grow their own businesses.
- → To make women agents of change by building their capacity to become leaders in their communities and thus contribute to a lasting positive impact.

OFI STRUCTURE


OFI's structure is divided into two teams:


- → the Bangalore office in India which is run on a pro bono basis by OFI's founder and current co-chair, Benjamine Oberoi, and includes 4 employees and
- \rightarrow the Board of Directors in France made up entirely of volunteers invested in OFI's mission.


USE OF FUNDS in 2024*
